REMINDER NOTICE Holabird Avenue Bridge Closure

The Holabird Avenue bridge (near the Art and Science Building, ASB) will be shut down for construction long-term (this includes cars AND pedestrians).

The CT DOT will have signs up with all detour notifications, and detour maps are available on the NCCC website homepage or click <u>here</u>.

The footbridge at the Art and Science Building over the river will remain open for easy pedestrian access between ASB, Greenwoods Hall, and the rest of the campus. Parking will continue to be available at the Art and Science Building.

Whiting Street (the road behind Founders Hall leading to ASB) will be <u>one way only</u> going north once construction starts, and access to ASB via Whiting Street from Route 44 will be available.

Are you a fan of Steve Rushin? Well, you should be excited! This local author is coming to Northwestern Connecticut Community College in Winsted. Steve Rushin will be talking about his book *The Pint Man*, at NCCC, on Tuesday, October 25, at 6:30 pm in Founders Hall Auditorium. At the conclusion of his talk there will be a reception and book signing. This is quite an opportunity and we encourage everyone to come.



Mr. Rushin has written for *Sports Illustrated*, *Time*, and *The New York Times*; he is also a four-time finalist for the National Magazine Award and has had his writing published in *The Best American Sports Writing*, *The Best American Travel Writing*, and *The Best American Magazine Writing* collections. He continues to write a weekly column for *Sl.com*.

Steve Rushin has often been celebrated for his fiction and non-fiction. His first book, *The Caddie Was a Reindeer* was published by Grove Atlantic in 2005 and named a semifinalist for the Thurber Prize for American Humor. His novel *The Pint Man* was published by Doubleday in 2010 and was noted as "Engaging, clever and often wipe-your-eyes-funny," by the *Los Angeles Times*. His book *Road Swing* was named by *Publishers Weekly* as one of the "Best Books of the Year" and one of the "Top 100 Sports Books of All Time" by *Sports Illustrated*. Then, in 2013, his nonfiction book *The Baseball Grenade* was published by Little, Brown. He currently resides with his wife Rebecca Lobo and their four children in Granby, Connecticut.

The Pint Man, is an incoming student read at NCCC this semester. Books will be available for purchase, or you can bring your own to have it signed. CWD—Non-credit Allied Health

FIRST AID and CPR - American Heart Association Heartsaver® First Aid CPR AED is a video-based, instructor-led course that teaches students critical skills needed to respond to and manage an emergency until emergency medical services arrives. Skills covered in this course include first aid; choking relief in adults, children, and infants; and what to do for sudden cardiac arrest in adults, children, and infants. Students learn skills such as how to treat bleeding, sprains, broken bones, shock and other first aid emergencies. This course teaches skills with the AHA's research-proven practice-whilewatching technique, which allows instructors to observe the students, provide feedback, and guide the students' learning of skills This course is for anyone with limited or no medical training who needs a course completion card in first aid to meet job, regulatory or other requirements. Upon completion of this course, students receive an American Heart Association Heartsaver First Aid Course Completion Card that is valid for two years.
