Course Title: "Intro To Therapeutic Recreation" Course Number: RLS *C121

Course Description: Therapeutic recreational services in hospitals, residential centers, correctional, and special institutions. Relationship of therapeutic recreation with other rehabilitative services.

Prerequisites: Knowledge in communication in computers-Access to a computer-Ability to return assignments to instructor—Ability to communicate with peers in online discussion posts created by instructor.

Goals: Students are expected to understand the roll of the professional Recreational Therapist in hospitals, long term facilities, corrections, assisted living communities, and in community settings for special care.

-Students are expected to be able to work in such settings as a

valuable member of the medical team.

-Students are expected to be able to identify various disabilities

and determine the individual's needs and interests so that appropriate

recreation programming can be determined and implemented.

-Students are expected to be familiar with public laws and with the customs and terminology related to the treatment of persons with disabilities.

Outcomes: Upon successful completion of this course the student will be able to:

-Recognize and identify the special population groups served by Therapeutic Recreation professionals.

-Identify various disabilities and the common symptoms of them.

-Understand key terminology as it relates to the practice of Therapeutic Recreation.

-Discuss Therapeutic Recreation from a historical and professional perspective -Identify some of the professional associations that promote knowledge and ethical practice in TR.

-Employ necessary standards for Therapeutic Recreation

-Successfully be able to implement Therapeutic Recreation programs- activities utilizing program planning with diverse populations-process evidenced in weekly case studies/creative workshops and individual program presentation.
